February/early March Programming

Stuffy Sleepover

We had a great turnout for this event. We had more than twice as many stuffies dropped off than last year (last year 5, this year 13). It's a fun event and the kids and families really seem to enjoy getting photos of their stuffed animals. I'm considering a teddy bear/stuffy picnic or tea party later in the year. Next year, I may need a second person to help me with photos as it did take a few hours to get photos of all the stuffies doing different activities.

Winter Wiggles Storytime

This was another well attended event. We had 8 kids and their families attend. Some of the families were not regular storytime families so it was good to reach new patrons. Will probably hold a similar event this spring.

Monday Matinee

Our February matinee was very well attended. We had 10 people. We had a Valentine's Day theme with chocolates and other treats and each attendee received a rose. Four people attended the March movie. We have now completed a full year of this program. I would call it a success as it reaches a previously underserved group and although the attendance fluctuates a bit, we always have a few people, and they are very appreciative of the event.

Book Club

Book club attendance is still on the low side, but we are giving out more books than ever of the monthly title.

Preschool Storytime

Our preschool storytime has doubled since the fall. At our Dr. Seuss's storytime, we had 12 kids and their families. It really is great to see these children grow and make connections as the weeks go by. I'm looking forward to moving the program outside once the weather is consistently warmer.

Spice Kits

We gave out 17 kits in February (rosemary). This month's kits are ready. The spice is caraway and we have given out about 8 kits since last week.

Winter Bingo

We had a great response to this month's contest. I'll be announcing winners on Monday.

Seed Library

The seed library opened on March 1, and more than a dozen packets of seeds have been "borrowed." We spent about \$50 on fresh seeds to supplement the seeds from last year. Special thanks to Robin for organizing all the packets.

Eclipse Glasses

Tuesday was the first day we handed out glasses. We gave out about 30 pairs on the first day. I think being open during voting helped bring people into the library for the glasses. We received 500 pairs of glasses, so we will hand them out on a first come-first serve basis.

TES Field Trip

True Cost of Food

March 18

We have invited Gene Jonas of the Hungry Bear Farm to give his presentation "The True Cost of Food" at the library in March.

True Cost of Food Description

Why does local food cost more than that which we buy from the grocery store? In this workshop farmer Gene Jonas will share with you information he obtained from reports that

used true cost accounting techniques that holistically analyzed the costs of the industrialized food production systems that dominate that landscape today. Additional information attained from articles, books, and other sources that shed light on the reality of the industrial food system that

predominates our society will also be presented. Whether you are an advocate of local food, a local farmer, or a home grower, this talk will hopefully convince you that often times the food you buy from local farmers is the best bang for the buck, especially if it grown to organic standards.

Solar Eclipse Presentation

March 27 (zoom)

We are excited to host NASA Ambassador Regina Conrad for a presentation on viewing the upcoming solar eclipse. Conrad will give a short history of solar eclipse viewing and discuss safe viewing practices. She will also share images of other total solar eclipses she has experienced.

Regina saw the moons of Jupiter for the first time on a cold December night in the Bronx, New York with binoculars. She spent her career as a research assistant in commercial semiconductor research and development facilities. In 2005, after viewing her first total solar eclipse, she started working weekends at the Andrus Planetarium in Yonkers, New York. A few years later, she was invited to be part of the Friday Night Astronomy series at the Stamford Museum and Nature Center in Stamford, Connecticut. In 2010, she had the opportunity to work on the NuSTAR optics. She moved to Lyndeborough, New Hampshire in 2013 and recently retired after over 9 years as J. A. Tarbell Library's programs coordinator. April 8, 2005, was her first total solar eclipse. April 8, 2024, will be her eighth.

Leap Into Spring with Snoopy

In this one-hour program children (ages 6 and up) and their caregivers will get up close and personal with a special Mini-Rex rabbit named Snoopy and learn all about a rabbits life as a leaper. This program will be presented by Claudia Dery.
